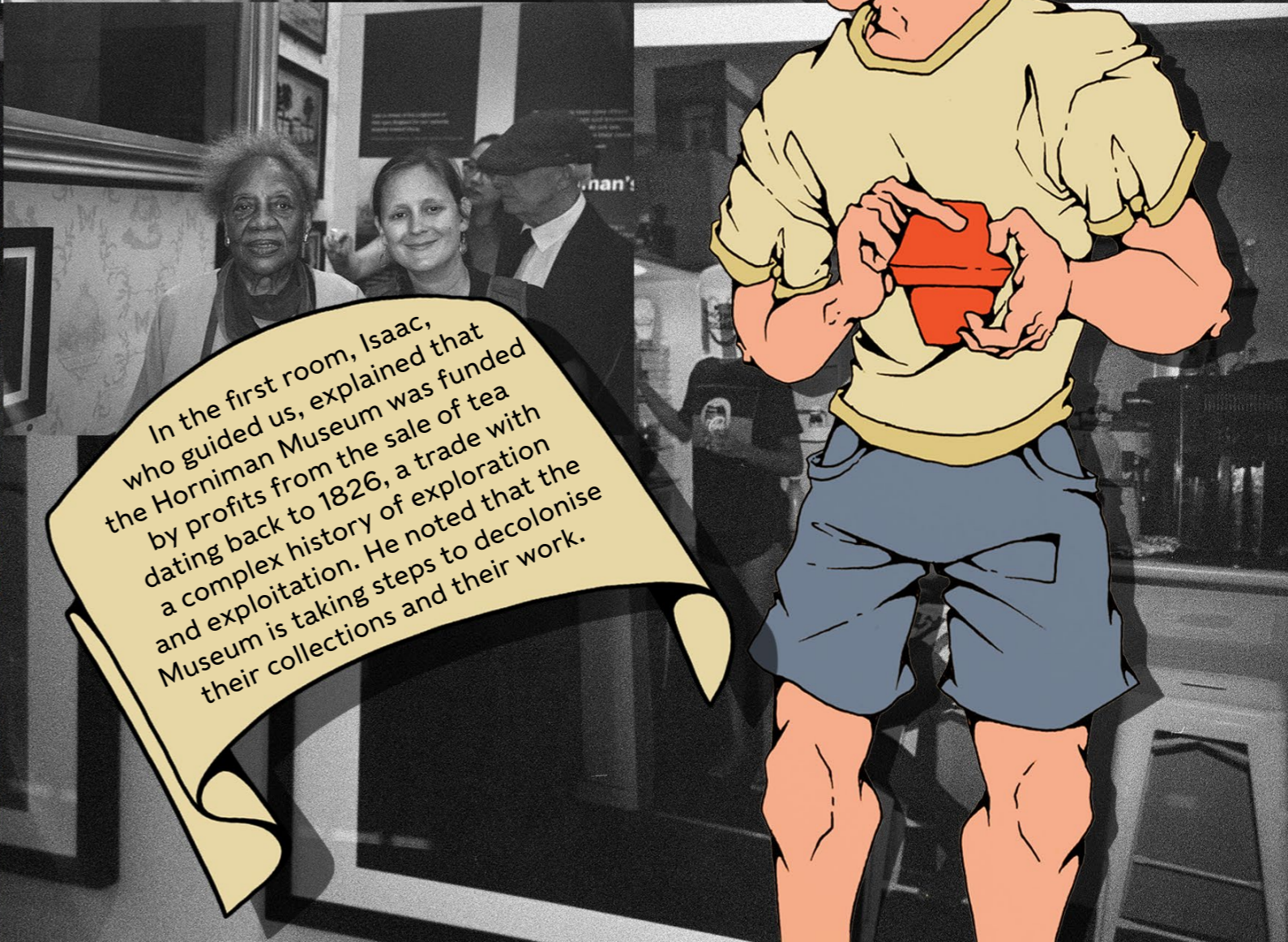
HORNPTIMAN MUSEUM

In the first room, Isaac, who guided us, explained that the Horniman Museum was funded by profits from the sale of tea dating back to 1826, a trade with a complex history of exploration and exploitation. He noted that the Museum is taking steps to decolonise their collections and their work.

We took a break to have a cup of tea, some biscuits and lunch. We spoke about the Museum and what memories the exhibitions bought up. Monica spoke about how the museum reminded her of combatting waves in Barbados; Rosemary spoke about signing a song about Ice Cream at the Horniman many years ago and Jim Spoke about how an exhibit reminded him of using an acorn and a straw to smoke tobacco.



In the final part of the trip, we visited aquarium. Rita mentioned that watching the fish swim by was really relaxing and that it could be therapeutic for people that were anxious to do the same.
